Editor's Note

We are pleased to announce the publication of the first issue of *Makiling* Review volume 3. This issue features works that examine relational dynamics, from the spheres of gender and sexuality to corporate culture, as mapped onto imaginative forms like literature and animè. Neal Amandus Gellaco's article examines fiction in English, particularly the works of Kerima Polotan Tuvera and Aida Rivera Ford, and their representation of lived life, turning to psychosocial criticism to elaborate on the dynamics of sexuality and repression. In her analysis of Efren Abueg's novel Mga Haliging Inaanay, Deirdre R. Morales tracks the social, particularly institutional, dynamics that shape ideas and attitudes about marriage and extramarital affairs. U.Z. Eliserio, in his essay on Filipino male fictionists, introduces the idea of "patriyarkal na nobelang Filipino" to bring to the fore the macho-feudal underpinnings of literary production and reception in the country. Cris Lanzaderas' article focuses on the deployment of kawaii culture in a popular Japanese series to reframe worker docility, and manage class tensions in the narrative world.

This issue also features the poetic works of MJ Rafal and Luna Sicat Cleto, which register the affective intensities that propel and shape political practices, mobilities, memory-making and desire. Rafal's found poetry makes use of book spines, as he touches on the tempests and anxieties of the current political dispensation. Sicat Cleto follows the rhythms of memory, displacement, and hunger in her poetic meditation "Linalansag ng Jazz ang Daloy ng Alaala." Such itinerant affect also becomes the subject of examination in Jay Jomar Quintos' review of Jaya Jacobo's *Arasahas*, *mga tula*, which maps the tropicality and tropologies of desire.
